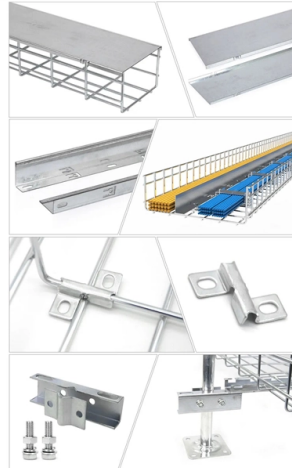


Can a secondary distribution box have a socket
